The Multistate Environmental Response Trust (the Multistate Trust) prepared this fact sheet to provide answers to frequently asked questions (FAQs) about the purpose and rationale for the Redevelopment Planning Initiative (RPI) for the KMCC Superfund Site (the Site).

Redevelopment Planning Initiative (RPI)**

Question: What is the KMCC Superfund Site Redevelopment Planning Initiative (RPI)?

Answer: The RPI is a planning process that engages the Navassa community in developing a potential plan or vision for future use of the Site.

Question: What will be the results of the KMCC Superfund Site RPI?

Answer: The primary RPI deliverable will be a “conceptual” master plan that depicts a possible plan for future use of the KMCC Superfund Site.

Question: How will the results of the KMCC Superfund Site RPI be used?

Answer: EPA may use the RPI results in selecting the Site cleanup plan. The Multistate Trust may use the RPI results to identify possible future users of the Site and, if approved by EPA and N.C. DEQ, to integrate future use into the remediation plans.

Question: Why is the Multistate Trust pursuing the KMCC Superfund Site RPI?

Answer: The Multistate Trust has *elected* to pursue the RPI because of the Multistate Trust’s belief that the Navassa community should have a significant voice in how the Site will be reused in the future.

Question: Is the Multistate Trust required to prepare a redevelopment plan for the KMCC Superfund Site?

Answer: Redevelopment planning for the Site is not required by EPA, N.C. DEQ or the Superfund cleanup laws.

Question: Will the Navassa community approve who acquires the KMCC Superfund Site?

Answer: Under the Court settlement, EPA and the Navassa Trustees Council are the only entities that can approve a transfer or sale of the Site.
